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Chairperson's Message

Dr. MAK Yim-wah



Dear Members and Colleagues,

I am pleased to announce that the Executive Committee (EC) of the Hong Kong Society for Nursing Education (our Society) has just been re-elected and will serve a term of two year from 2012 to 2014. I am honoured to be elected as the Chairperson. On the 26th birthday of our Society, Dr. Sharron Leung, the immediate past Chairperson and the EC members handed over our society's business to the new EC. For the past 26 years, our Society has been contributing to promoting nursing education of Hong Kong. It has effectively fulfilled its mission of advancing nursing education through participating in developing nursing education policies and continuous professional development of nurses. Our society participates actively in public consultation groups and exercises. We have formulated positions on professional issues, and made our positions known to the nursing community, the government, and all stakeholders. We have made significant contributions to the milestone development of establishing the Hong Kong Academy of Nursing (HKAN). Our society maintains its status as a Continuing Nursing and Midwifery Education Provider as accredited by the Nursing Council of Hong Kong and the Midwives Council of Hong Kong. We have been successfully organising local, regional and international professional events. While we celebrate our society's accomplishment, we are conscious of the changes in the local healthcare and

professional landscape, and we need to consider how we position ourselves in these changes.

Need for Transforming the Nursing Education

What impacts today's healthcare system most is the fast aging population with increased life expectancy. In 2020, one in four Hong Kong people will age 65 or above. The projected life expectancy of males will increase from 80.5 in 2011 to 83.7 in 2039, and that of females from 86.7 in 2011 to 90.1 in 2039 (Department of Health, 2011). There would be many more elderly people who would live longer. Whether they could enjoy good quality of life depends on how well their health needs are met. The model of care needs to extend from acute hospital care to primary and long term care in the community and the client's home. Moreover, as Hong Kong is going to develop into an international healthcare hub, nurses are facing more patients from various socio-cultural backgrounds, or from regions with unknown communicable diseases. A new set of professional competencies are required of the nurse to meet the changing needs. The nursing education system must be able to prepare nurses with the required knowledge, competent clinical skills, ability to understand individual needs of the client, ability to make accurate judgment and plan appropriate interventions. *Is the nursing education system in Hong Kong ready for preparing the nurses needed today?*

Challenges usually come with new opportunities. Nursing educators should ride on the momentum of changes and new demands to explore innovative ways of preparing the new generation of nursing professionals. Nursing education reform cannot wait and move when changes take place. Today, shortage of nurses seems not to be a big issue and we have no shortage of high performing school leavers to apply for the nursing programmes, particularly those at the bachelor level. This year, because of the changes in secondary school education, two different cohorts of nursing students will start their undergraduate study at universities. These students are admitting from the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination (HKALE) and the first Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education (HKDSE). They will spend 4 and 5 years' time in the programme respectively. Our society is mindful of the difficulties caused by the different entry levels and durations of study. We expect that universities would offer extra resources and support for faculty in order that the quality of education would not be compromised.

Future Cooperation Opportunities

Being a milestone development of the nursing profession, the Provisional Hong Kong Academy of Nursing (PHKAN) has finally been established. Our Society has been instrumental for the establishment of PHKAN. Professor Frances Wong and Professor Sally Chan, our Society's ex-Chairpersons had contributed to most part of the work during the formation period of the PHKAN. The PHKAN is expected to become the HKAN, a statutory body for accrediting advanced nursing practitioners. However, our Society, being an independent professional group, would not be a part of the PHKAN. Under the umbrella of the PHKAN, there are 14 Member Colleges. The Hong Kong College of Education & Research in Nursing (HKCERN) is one of these Colleges. The HKCERN becomes a new professional group looking into nursing education matters alongside our 26-year-old Hong Kong Society for Nursing Education. As a matter of fact, two of our society's ex-Chairpersons including Professor Frances Wong and Dr. Sharron Leung, and myself have contributed actively in founding the HKCERN, and are currently serving as office bearers of the HKCERN. *Then, what would be the way forward for our Society?*

Our Society's Executive Committee is exploring the ways that our Society could work with the HKCERN, for examples, by collaboration, cooperation, or even a merger. The following reasons have been considered:

1. Our Society and the HKCERN have similar missions of promoting nursing education in Hong Kong.
2. Some individuals currently hold key positions in both our Society and the HKCERN, and actually work on very similar professional issues. It would be a duplication of efforts of these individuals working on the same things in two different groups.

3. It is likely that many members of our Society would become Fellows in the HKCERN. Because of the statutory status of the future HKAN, new members tend to join the HKCERN. Our Society could face difficulties with membership drive.

The Members of our Society's Executive Committee are aware that their views on collaboration with the HKCERN may not reflect the Members will. The scenario of merging our Society with the HKCERN may be seen as the termination of our Society, or positively, a re-birth of our Society with a new face. The Executive Committee have not had the chance to hear the views of the Members, particularly the Life Members of our Society who had put in much efforts in establishing our Society 26 years ago and running our Society for these years.

The next step is that we would like to invite all Members to an open forum in the form of a retreat. You could share your thoughts over the future of our Society, and possible cooperation with the HKCERN. All ex-chairpersons of our Society and current Members of the Executive Committee are invited in person to join this retreat. We believe that we would find our way forward through open discussion. Report on 26th Anniversary Symposium and Annual General Meeting

The 26th Anniversary Symposium, the Annual General Meeting and Anniversary Dinner were held on 14 April, 2012 at the YMCA of Hong Kong, 4th Floor North Tower, Salisbury Road, Tsimshatsui, Kowloon, Hong Kong.

Approximately 150 delegates from Singapore, Macau and Hong Kong joined the Symposium and celebration. Dr. Sharron LEUNG, Chairperson of our Society, started off the symposium by welcoming Society Members and Distinguished Guests.

The theme of the Symposium was 'Clinical Outcomes and Advanced Nursing Practice'. The Keynote Speech was delivered by Professor Claudia LAI, Professor, from School of Nursing, Hong Kong Polytechnic University. It was followed by a plenary with the following speakers from Singapore and Hong Kong:

中醫與護理

護士工作與你的健康：你是一個EQ低的護士嗎？

「白衣天使」給人善良及有愛心的感覺。但近日聽到有人說「那一個護士真的很凶惡」，「算了吧！做護士很大壓力的。」。

適當的壓力令人時常提高警覺，3 checks 5 rights，保持安全有效率的護理質素。但過度的壓力則會使人焦慮、抑鬱、失去自信、情緒低落，並會引致「皮質醇」（壓力荷爾蒙）增加，影響身體健康。

中醫認為過量或不適當的「七情：喜怒憂思悲恐驚」都是引起疾病的因素；在日常工作中，護士受到很大的壓力，卻又不能舒發情緒，日積月累，便會影響內臟功能。所謂：「大怒傷肝」，出現頭痛、失眠、暗瘡、便秘、情緒不穩定、月經失調等等。除了keep住深呼吸來減低壓力外，可以飲用以下的花茶，有助舒肝解鬱，為你的EQ加油。

菊花茶、玫瑰花茶

材料：(一人份量)乾菊花(杭菊)或乾玫瑰花一至二錢(3-6克)

做法：先將菊花或玫瑰花放在茶壺內，加入滾水100cc，沖洗後立刻倒去，再加滾水200 - 300cc焗一會兒便可飲用，喜歡甜的可加糖。

宜忌：菊花性涼，容易肚瀉不宜。玫瑰花性溫，口乾熱氣不宜。

生命影響生命 ~ 護士學生的歷程**邁向專業一大步**

五年前的今天剛開始登記護士轉註冊護士課程的我，心情顛顛驚驚，心想及又要回到做功課、讀書、考試和實習的日子，就像一條漫長而又艱辛的路。更甚是既要上班又要兼顧學業，真是疲於奔命！其實，我亦曾經想過“為何要轉做註冊護士呢？”，自問在登記護士的工作崗位上十分稱職，做一個專業的登記護士同樣都會得到病人尊重，但是原來這並不足夠。

記得我有一個好上司，她曾對我說：做事不能只看一點，要看遠些。當時我真的不明白，難道我做得不夠好？怎樣才能看遠些？又要看甚麼呢？直至讀了這個課程，我開始明白她所指的是護理工作上的整全護理，這樣才可使病人得到專業的護理服務，令他們身、心、社、靈都得到照顧，這才稱得上一個「稱職」的護士。真的衷心感激這位好上司！當然少不了家人和朋友的支持與鼓勵，才能令我堅持到最後完成這個課程。

另外，在註冊護士課程中最難忘的是在社康護理部實習，社康護士不論晴天或雨天都背起重重的背包四處上門為病人施行護理服務，無論環境如何惡劣，她們都會竭盡所能，提供專業的護理服務，真的十分佩服！更令我獲益良多！

不經不覺已畢業了年多的時間，在我的護理生涯中，我無時無刻都會問自己是否一個稱職的護士呢（不論是註冊或登記護士）？因為我們要面對的是病人的生命絕不能輕率。最後，希望可以將我所學的臨床護理經驗教導初入職的護士及護士學生，讓他們「好好」成長，好讓專業的護理服務能夠薪火相傳，而我亦會繼續努力，希望在未來的日子能夠在病房中獨當一面。

**「愛滋病」，怕? 不怕...**

對「愛滋病」一詞相信大家並不陌生。大家或許曾在電視或電影橋段中認識愛滋病，但都能夠透切瞭解嗎？作為護士學生的我亦對它感到相當的「陌生」... ..

幸運地，我於實習中能初次接觸愛滋病帶菌者，從中由「陌生」慢慢轉為對它「略有認識」。對於自己，接觸愛滋病患者是一件幸事，但自己的家人及朋友卻認為這是一件苦差，原因是心怕我受到感染。其實周遭的人就是社會縮影，他們的憂慮，疑惑是能夠諒解的。不過我明白到只要適當地處理便不會受到感染。

其實，現在中國有許多居住於偏遠地區的居民，透過共用針筒或不安全的性交等，而成為愛滋病患者，可見他們對愛滋病傳染的意識是相當薄弱，這亦可解釋到中國愛滋病患者人數仍持續高漲的關鍵。

愛滋病患者可以繁衍下一代嗎？我相信每個人都有不同見解，但令我感到最大的疑惑是，作為愛滋病患者當決定孕育下一代時，是否應具備足夠的知識和責任心去照顧孩子及其身邊的人？

在病房中我遇見的愛滋病帶菌者，是一位天真無邪的小男孩。他的父母叮囑醫生及護士們不可將病情外洩，連每天照顧病者的外婆也不知道小男孩的病況。當時小男孩頸上有多個膿泡，極有機會破皮穿水。在未進行刺穿膿泡手術前，我們已用紗布蓋上，以防小童或他人刮穿膿泡而接觸到膿泡液，受到感染。但小孩的母親竟因兒子蓋上紗布感到不適為由，擅自拆開紗布。她的處理手法對病者、外婆，甚至醫護人員都是十分不負責任，將他人的安全置之不理。難道對這些行為，她沒有感到需要留意嗎？

其實上述事情都反映出絕大部份人都對愛滋病是一知半解，可想而知教育是相當重要。因此希望政府及慈善機構能多透過不同渠道去廣泛教育市民，及宣傳正確的愛滋病訊息。愛滋病患者除了要得到適當的生理照顧外，心理上的護理都同樣重要。不論對家人及病患者，護士們給予的接納、關懷及體諒都不能缺少。

親愛的朋友，這兩個星期的實習，好累...
肌肉的疲勞，以前的經驗告訴我，會適應的。
可是，總是睡不好。
很多時候，我總不禁想起病人的臉孔...

嘻！你知道嗎？嗅覺的記憶原來很強勁。
我現在無時無刻都會想起大小便和傷口的氣味。
它們是很強勁的減肥藥，食飯的時候，腦海閃過那一陣陣的味道，胃口... 全消...
我無數次在想，我那些中了風的病人，駁著氧氣機，手腳關節全都僵硬，不能動彈，每天聞著自己這些味道，
會是甚麼感覺？

朋友，你知道嗎？從小到大，我的生命裡都不會有我公公婆婆爺爺嬤嬤的參與。
來到這個老人病房，我覺得，婆婆們好親切！
跟她們在一起，我覺得，好像彌補了我跟長輩們相處的那一塊缺失了的經歷。
我好喜歡有空的時候，走到床邊跟她們談天，替她們抹面。
我好喜歡看她們笑，我覺得她們的笑容好溫暖。
有一些有反應的病人，會認得我，跟我撒嬌，我覺得好窩心。
有一些不能說話，不能有反應的病人，替她們更換尿片和量血壓度體溫時，我會看著她們的眼睛跟她們說話，
幫她們抹眼睛。日子久了，聽到她們會嘗試「唔唔」發聲，微微點頭給我反應，我很開心！是真的很開心！因為我知道她們認得我。
幾天前，我跟朋友聊天，談及我的病人，說著說著，不知道為甚麼，我就哭了。
我跟朋友說，我覺得她們很可憐，我很心痛她們的苦。
那一刻，我才發現，原來，其實，來到病房實習看到的一切，對我，是很震撼的！

我每天看著病人們，我替她們感到很無奈...
有時候，我在忙，無幫法回應她們的要求。事後回想，我總會很內疚。
每次，幫婆婆們做事，就算只是吃飯時幫她們倒一杯熱水，婆婆們就會很感動的說「謝謝」。
有時候，聽了，我心裡會覺得難受，心酸...
無數次我都覺得病人很沒有尊嚴，生命都不被尊重了...
朋友，你知道嗎？我覺得有時候，病房職員對病人的言語暴力讓我很不習慣。
從病房的體驗裡，我悟出的結論是：愛心，在醫院，是可遇不可求的。
暗自嘆息的是，這樣的我們，能如何說服別人，醫護的工作是神聖的？

有時候，跟婆婆們談天，她們說著說著就會哭起來... 有時候，我只能握著她們的手，咀巴早已繃緊得說不出話...
那些情況不好的病人，又從來沒有人來探望，無數次，我都靜了下來，我的感覺很複雜...
有時候，我在想，如果連我們都不相信病人是有希望的，病人的生存意志能從哪裡來？
有前輩跟我說，她會跟每個病人都訂一個目標，有一些目標，可以是病情不會轉差。
可是... 我覺得... 那樣的話... 生存的理由是甚麼？

就是這些累積下來的思緒，再加上來自病人的無力感、來自自己的無奈、來自身體的疲累、有一些情緒就形成了。

雖然，我對我的工作還是很盡力，很認真，很愛護我的病人，很希望能為她們盡一點力。
可是，心裡總有一股頹廢感等我去消化...
你記不記得我說過，來當護士的其中一個原因是，我想知道在苦難裡，生命的意義是甚麼？上帝的存在在哪裡？
這兩個星期，我有很多思緒纏在腦海，很多很多...
最近，我跟上帝說了很多話。

我很感恩，神給予了我很好的前輩們。在工作技能上和工作態度上都幫了我很多，教了我很多，感染我好深。
可是，我想，神留下了一份功課給我。祂希望我自己去找一個工作上的定位。也許，其實一個人能做的不多。

親愛的朋友，請容讓我把思緒分一點給你。心裡那種感覺，是一種很奇怪的感覺，我不知道誰會明白。我需要好好去消化。

可是，我非常肯定，我會愛我的工作！

30 April 2012

Nursing and Midwifery sub-group on strategic review on healthcare manpower planning and professional development

Dr. MAK Yim-wah, Chairperson of the Society, joined a meeting organized by a steering committee headed by Dr. York CHOW, Secretary for Food and Health, with a group of representatives of nurses, midwives stakeholders of community health services and patient representatives. The meeting aimed to collect and consolidate views from the sub-group members regarding the manpower of nurses and midwives, and the issues related to nurses shortage and the development of nursing as a profession. During the meeting, discussions were made on the current challenges affecting the adequate supply of nurses and midwives, manpower planning and professional development of nurses and midwives. Key issues raised are as the followings:

1. Difficulties in recruiting nurses are not just encountered in public, but private sectors; not just in hospitals, but also in communities with a particular demand of midwives, nurses working for psychiatric nursing care or old age homes.
2. The review should also look into the need for specialization of nurses and one-level nursing to enhance professionalism in nursing, and also the resulting implications for training programmes and career pathways for nurses.
3. Retaining nurses is the key problem with the overall nursing manpower, either during the training stage or after graduation.
4. In spite of the need for a plan to secure a sufficient supply of nurses, the quality of nurses should, however, not be compromised.
5. Specialization of the nursing profession would enhance nurses' professional pride and the community's recognition of the profession. This in turn might help addressing the retention problem.
6. A more effective manpower planning could be done by first a clear definition of the expected roles of nurses and other healthcare professionals, the types of work that should be done by nurses, as well as the different ranks of nurses involved in each type of work.
7. Government support in terms of funding and policy making in enhancing the development of the nursing profession is important.
8. Chairperson of the meeting, Prof Stephen Cheung promised to follow up this matter not to merely address it like submitting "homework" before the end of the present term of the steering committee.

12 May 2012

Supporting the establishment of Provisional Hong Kong Academy of Nursing and organizing the International Nurses' Day Dinner

The International Nurses' day was a memorable day for the nursing profession in Hong Kong. It celebrated the inauguration of the Provisional Hong Kong Academy of Nursing (PHKAN) and 14 Academy Colleges. An inaugural ceremony was held on 12 May 2012. Members of the Society had actively participated in preparing the ceremony by joining working groups of publicity and promotion, inauguration ceremony, and the dinner program. The dinner was held at Ocean Palace Restaurant at Hung Hom. Hundreds of guests attended the event and witnessed the historical moments together. They included government officials of the Guangdong Province, Macau and Hong Kong; leaders of various health care organizations; educators of different universities and institutions and nurses from all sorts of sectors.

A course on "Mental Health First Aid Standard Course" was organized by the Society and the Mental Health Association of Hong Kong.
